

Low temperatures freeze several areas of Niagara Falls

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Several areas of Niagara Falls on the border between the U.S. and Canada are frozen by the low temperatures recorded in February and last Wednesday fell to 20 degrees below zero.

Visitors to the falls can enjoy a unique, extensive areas of the tourist attraction covered by a thick layer of ice.

Although it is summer when the geographical border between the United States and Canada each day attracts thousands of tourists, even in the heart of the Canadian winter, some daring venture.

The Spanish tourist Juan Manuel Alava has commented that he had previously visited the falls during the summer but in winter the spectacle is even more impressive. "It is absolutely spectacular. I was in the summer and I loved it. But in winter, ice cream, is a true wonder. From the most beautiful I have ever seen," he explained.

Jackie Tenuta, a Canadian town of Winnipeg, has also stressed the difference between summer and winter. "The waterfalls are amazing in the winter. The ice is beautiful. I do not like the cold and even in one day is so beautiful but frigid worth it. I have seen before but not in winter, so it is something special to enjoy this way," he said.

It is a show that is repeated most years at this time but did not last long. The Meteorological Institute of Canada anticipates that beginning Monday, temperatures at Niagara Falls is located above zero on Wednesday and run to a maximum of 11 degrees centigrade, which melt much of the ice icicles now hang on the walls.
