

Canadian landmarks to be lit up tomorrow, July 14

July 13, 2021



On the occasion of France's national holiday, Canada's iconic sites will be lit up in blue, white, and red, the colors of the French flag.

From Toronto to Halifax, the colors of France will illuminate the night of July 14, 2021, in Canada.

The participating sites are the following:

- Niagara Falls (10:00 pm EST) ;
- Toronto's CN Tower (9 p.m. EST);
- Montreal's Ferris Wheel (approximately 8:45 p.m. EST, at sunset);
- The Nova Scotia Legislature in Halifax (at sunset);
- The New Brunswick Legislative Assembly in Fredericton (at sunset);
- The French Embassy in Ottawa (starting at 9 p.m. EST).
